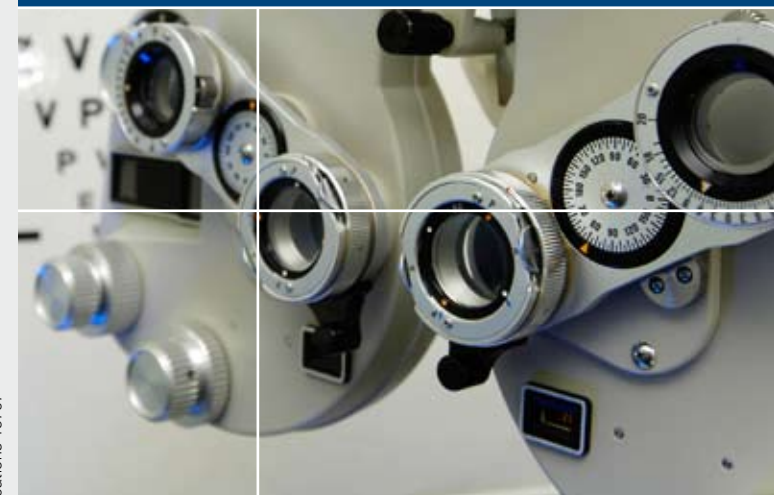
Taxi drop-off is located at the Blamey Street side of the building, a short walk to the ground floor entrance in Musk Avenue.

OPTOMETRY

The Vision Rehabilitation Centre (VRC) provides a comprehensive service to people with vision impairment through a multidisciplinary rehabilitation team.

SOCIAL WORK

Our social worker or a welfare officer from the Royal Blind Foundation of Queensland interviews the patients, and families if necessary, to determine the impact of the vision impairment on lifestyle.

They have an extensive knowledge of community services available and will liaise with and refer to these services when necessary, to help meet the broad needs of the visually impaired person.

OPTOMETRY

Patients are examined by Optometry students under the supervision of experienced optometrists. Optical low vision devices are available on loan or for purchase. A charge is applicable for these devices.

OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY

Our occupational therapists assess patients' management of their daily activities at work, study or home. They can provide advice or assistive devices to improve daily activities for patients. The devices range from simple devices for use in the home, to closed circuit TVs and the latest computerised information technology for use at home or with study or work.

ORIENTATION AND MOBILITY

Our orientation and mobility instructor from the Guide Dogs for the Blind Association of Queensland provides assessment and some instruction on everyday mobility needs. If a full mobility program is required this can be organised through the Guide Dogs for the Blind Association.
